Baird, Charles W. *History of the Huguenot Emigration to America*. New York, NY: Dodd, Mead & Company Publishers, 1885.

This is an excellent history of the French Huguenots and the reasons they left France for Holland, England, and eventually, America. It discusses the challenges they faced in the New World.

This history of the founding of the Huguenot church and settlement on Staten Island in 1661 is well footnoted and gives valuable insight into this period.

This article provided numerous images and descriptions of the French potager stoves, like the ones built by Etienne Gayneau, Sr.

Journal of De Bever July – May 1661 Translation. New York Historical Society, Vanderhoof Project, 2012.

The original document '*Journal Behouden opt'schip den Gulden Bever en t'schip den Gulden Otter*' is held by the New York Historical Society; Ref MSS.Ships.Journals.1600/Ships Collection Box 1 Folder #34 and a transcript of the original is included as Appendix A. The Journal contains descriptions of four voyages based on notes by an unknown author, probably an employee of the Dutch West India Company. The first voyage is the one of interest here as it details the voyage on which the Gayneau Family traveled from Holland to New Amsterdam in 1661.

This was a valuable resource for showing the 17th century French blade weapons and styles of fencing at the time. It includes numerous images.

This book contains 81 illustrations of different types of ships and descriptions of them and their uses.
